


SAN FRANCISCO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

District Spotlight

This fact sheet shows how San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) is serving its students of diverse backgrounds, based on the latest state test scores in English and math. It also shows the percentage of students that are graduating from the district, and the percentage of those graduates that have completed the coursework necessary to apply to a UC or CSU.


SFUSD enrolled 53,065 students in 2016-17. African American, Latino, and Pacific Islander students make up over one-third of students in the district.

Number of students enrolled by school type, 2016-17




Children in San Francisco are enrolled in private school at over twice the rate of California as a whole, and its private K-12 enrollment is one of the highest in the nation.

Charter schools enroll less than 7% of public school students in San Francisco. These students are more likely to be low-income, African American or Latino.

White and Asian students make up half of SFUSD, and those groups are performing well above the California average. However, there are very large gaps in how well the district is doing for African American, Latino and Pacific Islander students.

Latino Student Spotlight

Latino students are the district's second largest student ethnic group and make up 27% of students in SFUSD (14,328 in total). This Spotlight includes all of the schools in San Francisco serving at least that same percentage of Latino students, as long as that school tested at least 20 of those students. 


Graduation Rates and College Eligibility

Although graduation rates are generally high, they don't tell the whole story. Less than half of the African American, Latino, and Pacific Islander graduates in SFUSD have completed the coursework requirements necessary to apply to a UC or CSU.

SFUSD's Statewide Performance

The graphs below highlight the district's percentile rank in English and math for low-income African American and Latino students relative to other unified districts throughout California. SFUSD performs worse than the vast majority of districts across the state for these students.
