

# **District Spotlight**


This fact sheet shows how San Jose Unified School District (SJUSD) is serving its students of diverse backgrounds, based on the latest state test scores in English and math. It also shows the percentage of students that are graduating from the district, and the percentage of those graduates that have completed the coursework necessary to apply to a UC or CSU.

SJUSD enrolled 30,930 students in 2016-17 with Latino students making up over half of students in the district. While the district has strong academic results for its White and Asian students, too many Latino students are left behind.





#### Percentage of Students Meeting or Exceeding Standards



## Percentage of High School Graduates\* Who Are UC/CSU Eligible




#### **Latino Student Spotlight**

Latino students make up 52% of students in SJUSD (16,041 in total). This Latino Student Spotlight includes all of the schools in San Jose serving at least that same percentage of Latino students.

Some other local schools are also included here as a comparison to the schools in SJUSD. These "comparison schools"\* (results shown in green) are local schools that serve a similar population to SJUSD and are achieving high results for this group of students.

For each school below, the pie charts show what percentage of Latino students are enrolled. The bar charts show what percentage of students are on grade level.



Denotes a school that had a "red" Suspension Indicator for Latino students on the California State Dashboard. This means that the school has an especially high suspension rate for Latino students and/or a significant increase in that suspension rate from the previous year.
