

SPOTLIGHT ON SOUTHEAST LAUSD

Southeast LAUSD: South Gate, Huntington Park, Maywood, Walnut Park, Florence-Graham, northern Central Alameda, Bell, Cudahy

Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) schools in the southeast enrolled 63,710 students in 2017-18. Latino students make up 97% of the student population in the region (61,695 students in total). 91% of students are low-income and Latino, and over a quarter (26%) are English Learners. This fact sheet shows how the southeast area of LAUSD Board District 5 is serving its Latino students based on the latest state test scores in English and math, graduation rates, and the percentage of graduates that have completed the coursework necessary to be eligible to apply to a UC or CSU.


 Most students (85%) in Southeast LAUSD attend district schools.

More than a quarter of those students attend a magnet district school. Charter schools enroll less than 15% of the region's students.

• Only four out of ten Latino students are on grade level in English and only three out of ten are on grade level in math.

In comparison, across LAUSD, seven out of ten White students are on grade level in English and six out of ten are on grade level in math.


 Out of 89 schools in the Southeast**, only 9 are above the state average for English and math.



Latino Student Spotlight - Elementary Schools

Most elementary students in Southeast LAUSD are Latino and 36% are English learners. Most schools (47 out of 49) enroll 25% or more English learners indicating many of the region's students (more than a third) enter the school system in need of language learning support. This spotlight includes all of the elementary schools in Southeast LAUSD serving 20 or more Latino students. Out of 49 elementary schools in Southeast LAUSD, only five reach the state average for English and eight for math.



Latino Student Spotlight - Middle Schools

Most middle school students in Southeast LAUSD are Latino and 18% are English learners. The proportion of English learners at each school ranges from 6% at International Studies Learning Center at Legacy High School Complex to 35% at Ellen Ochoa Learning Center but most schools (14 out of 20) enroll 15% or more English learners.


This spotlight includes all of the middle schools Southeast LAUSD serving 20 or more Latino students. Out of 20 middle schools in Southeast LAUSD, only three reach the state average for English and two for math.



Latino Student Spotlight - High School

Most high school students in Southeast LAUSD are Latino and 14% are English learners. The proportion of English learners at each school ranges from 6% at International Studies Learning Center at Legacy High School Complex to 29% at Thomas Jefferson Senior High. Half of the high schools enroll at least 10% or more English learners.

This spotlight includes all of the high schools in Southeast LAUSD serving 20 or more Latino students. Out of 20 high schools in Southeast LAUSD, thirteen reach the state average for English and three for math. The schools reaching or exceeding the state average in English and math in the region are International Studies Learning Center at Legacy High School Complex, Aspire Ollin University Preparatory Academy, and Alliance Collins Family College-Ready High.
